**The next few months represent the peak time for thunderstorms, tropical cyclones, flooding, heatwaves, and bushfires.**

**Severe weather can damage our homes, roads, and neighbourhoods.**

**It can also disrupt essential services and isolate individuals and communities.**

**You can reduce the impact of severe weather by getting ready before it happens.**

Flooding is always a risk, with riverine and coastal areas more likely to experience its impacts.

Tropical cyclones, tropical lows, and severe thunderstorms can bring heavy rainfall and lead to localised or widespread flooding.

Records show at least one tropical cyclone makes landfall in Australia each season. It only takes one to have serious impacts from heavy rainfall, damaging winds and storm surge.

Last season tropical cyclones Zelia, Dianne, Alfred and Errol all led to significant flooding.
