3	<p><b>Older People Experiencing Social Isolation – Townsville —</b> Stacey Eilers, Life Without Barriers</p> <p> <b>Recording starts at 26:11</b></p> <p><b>Overview:</b> Life Without Barriers delivers the <i>Be Connected</i> program, supporting older people (60+, or 50+ for First Nations) to stay socially connected, engaged, and confident. The program is person-centred, flexible, and 12 weeks long, including goal setting, individual and group activities, community events, and ongoing support from Care</p>	

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	<p>Coordinators and Support Workers. Partnerships with local organisations ensure complementary, not duplicated, supports.</p> <p><b>Participants:</b> Those at risk of social isolation, including older men living alone, people over 80, those in rental or aged care, older carers, CALD communities, and residents in rural/remote areas.</p> <p><b>Program Approach:</b> Guided by principles of empowerment, cultural respect, holistic care, and strengths-based engagement. Focuses on understanding individual stories, building trust, and taking small steps to foster belonging.</p> <p><b>Successes:</b> Achieving goals that seemed out of reach (reconnecting with hobbies, attending events), building confidence and friendships, and creating smooth pathways for sustained connection beyond the program.</p> <p><b>Challenges:</b> Complex barriers such as transport, cost of living, declining mobility, caring responsibilities, hesitancy to engage, and balancing high demand with program capacity.</p> <p><b>Key Messages:</b> Connection is not one-size-fits-all; trust, patience, and listening are as important as action. Collaboration across services creates sustainable pathways for engagement.</p> <p><b>Reflections from Age Well Stay Connected:</b> Importance of meaningful, safe, and welcoming activities; embedding older people’s input; small actions often have the biggest impact; and ongoing collaboration strengthens outcomes.</p>	
4	<p><b>LGBTI Seniors Visiting Service</b></p> <p>Riley Naish, Queensland Council for LGBTI Health, Townsville</p> <p> <b>Recording starts at 38:59 mins</b></p> <p><b>Overview:</b> Riley runs the LGBTI Sister Girl and Brother Boy community visiting service, acknowledging the lands of members present and speaking on the program’s regional coverage and benefits of the <i>Age Well Stay Connected</i> event.</p> <p><b>Participant Experiences:</b> LGBTI Elders often face higher rates of loneliness and social isolation, and lower wellbeing, due to historical and ongoing discrimination. Their experiences can continue into aged care, home environments, and everyday social interactions.</p> <p><b>Program Approach:</b> Funded through the Aged Care Volunteer Visitors Scheme, the program matches older LGBTI individuals with trained LGBTI volunteers. Weekly visits—such as coffee chats, walks, and storytelling—provide companionship, rebuild trust, reduce loneliness, and affirm participants’ value and belonging in the community.</p>	

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	<p><b>Impact of Age Well Stay Connected:</b> The event increased visibility of older LGBTI people, fostered connections with allies and providers, and led to new referrals for the visiting service. Participants engaged with QC’s monthly morning tea, and ongoing partnerships (e.g., with Life Without Barriers) support sector-wide training and inclusive practice. 5	<p><b>Seniors Adventures Program</b></p> <p>Chrissy and Tracey, Community Development Workers, Port Douglas Community Centre</p> <p> <b>Recording starts at 46.00 mins</b></p> <p><b>Overview:</b> The Neighbourhood Centre has run the <i>Seniors Adventures Program</i> for 12 months, engaging local seniors through monthly excursions to local attractions (e.g., Mossman Cultural Centre, Tablelands, Cairns Aquarium) on the third Thursday of each month. Trips are heavily subsidised (\$10 commitment fee), with program staff including Chrissy, Geoff, and Tracey providing a mix of guidance and intergenerational support. Participant input has strongly shaped the program.</p> <p><b>Challenges and Opportunities:</b> Demand exceeds current capacity due to shuttle bus limits (10 people per trip), with a waitlist in place. A grant-funded loan vehicle will allow an additional four participants per month over 12 months. Plans are underway to expand weekly drop-in coffee and cake sessions, introduce a monthly “lunch with friends,” and improve facilities (air-conditioning for larger meeting spaces).</p> <p><b>Scheduling and Promotions:</b> Participation is tracked to ensure fairness, with flexibility for individuals facing personal challenges.
